Where Do We Start?



- 1. Recognize what is happening in the world around us. (both natural & human caused)
- 2. Fully commit to Emergency Preparedness (EP). (top to bottom)
- 3. Utilize a "whole community approach".

(utilize subject matter experts)

Who Can Help Me?



- 1. Local police and fire departments
- 2. Your town's building inspector and other officials, such as health officer
- 3. Emergency Management Director (EMD)
- 4. Your insurance provider
- 5. Neighboring and national FBCOs

Where Are We Vulnerable?



Think with an "All-Hazards" Approach

- Medical Emergencies
- Pandemic/Viral
- Cyber Security (D.O.S., fishing attacks, etc.)
- Social Media Vulnerabilities
- Vandalism / Theft / Hate Crimes
- Loss of Personally Identifiable Information (PII)
- Abuse of the Vulnerable (children, elderly)
- Fire
- Winter Weather (slips and falls)
- Active Threat (intent to injure or kill)
- Suspicious Packages / Bomb Threats

But...There's Just So Much!



- Crawl (discussion-workshops to develop plans)
- Walk (implementation-validate plans with discussion-based drills)
- RUN (execution practice your plans, then revise as needed)
- Determine ALL your stakeholders!

Let's Get a Team Focused on This...



- Discuss an approach strategy with your leadership...get involvement, not just "buy-in".
- Talk about intentions with your congregation...build more involvement.
- Pull a team together...utilize involvement.
- Tackle "low hanging fruit" first, then bigger goals...maximize involvement.

Teach, Train, Exercise...Repeat



- TEACH an all-hazards approach to EP
- TRAIN all staff (paid and volunteer)
- EXERCISE your plans (Workshop, TTX, Functional)
- RINSE & REPEAT (repetition builds capacity, turnover depletes capacity)

A Few Emergency Preparedness (EP) Core Capabilities



- Planning (internal and municipality)
- Mitigation (prevention)
- Situational Awareness
- Threat Hazard Identification & Planning
- Communication, Coordination
- Public Information (internal and external)

What is an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)?



- EP guidance document uniquely built, customized and applied to your organization
- Drives your EP training, budget, equipment, exercises and responses
- Needs broad stakeholder involvement
- Needs to be updated annually

Real-World Action Steps?



- 1. Have open, inclusive discussions
- 2. Invite local fire and police into your world
- 3. Perform self-assessment
- 4. Connect with other and affiliated local FBCOs; compare notes and resources.
- 5. Apply for annual federal Non-Profit Security Grant
- Participate in emergency management classes (i.e. MGT 405, FEMA IS classes, and online webinars)
- 7. Attend or facilitate all-hazards exercises (tabletop and functional)
- 8. Join CERT, VOAD, Red Cross, Salvation Army, etc. efforts to keep your community safe
- 9. Participate in your town's Emergency Operations Plan planning group
